# Highlights of the 2014 Farm Bill For Specialty Crops

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#### Overview

- Victory for Specialty Crops
- Small share of federal spending, but considerably expanded
  - Funding levels increased by 55% over 2008 Farm Bill to about \$3 Billion (United Fresh)
- Funding highlights through FY 2018
  - o \$1 Billion to purchase specialty crops for schools and service institutions
  - o \$400 Million Specialty Crop Research Initiative
  - o \$375 Million Specialty Crop Block Grants
  - o \$325 Million Consolidated Clean Plant Network
  - o Up to \$200 Million Farmers' Market and Local Food Promotion Program
  - o \$167.5 Million Organic Agriculture
  - o Up to \$140 Million Food Insecurity Nutrition Incentive
- o \$45 Million Technical Assistance for Specialty Crops

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#### What's New?

1. Use of SNAP Benefits for Purchase of Community-Supported Agriculture (CSA) Share

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle A, Sec. 4012

 Retail food stores that can accept SNAP benefits now include ag. producers who market *Directly to Consumers (D2C)*: Farmers' markets, roadside stands, and CSAs





## 2. Technology Modernization for Retail Food Stores

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle A, Sec. 4011

- **Pilot projects** to test the feasibility of Retail Food Stores (RFS) accepting SNAP benefits through:
  - o Mobile transactions
  - o On-line transactions
- Pilots should be completed by July 1st, 2016
- If successful, both will be implemented nationwide by January 1st, 2017

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# 3. Pilot Project for Buying Unprocessed F&V

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle C, Sec. 4202

- Objective: To help states buy unprocessed fruits and vegetables (F&V) in a <u>flexible</u> way
- Flexibility States can choose <u>multiple suppliers and products</u>, and <u>buy local if desired</u>
- 8 states participating in the National School Lunch Program
- Eligibility based on:
- 1. Quantity and variety of local F&V in the states on a percapita basis
- 2. Demonstrated commitment to Farm-to-School efforts
- 3. Quantity of local educational agencies



#### 4. Pulse Crop Products

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle C, Sec. 4213

- The Secretary will buy pulse products (Dry beans, dry peas, lentils, and chickpeas) for use in the National School Lunch and National School Breakfast programs
- Child acceptance and product suitability will be evaluated in 2016



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#### 5. Pilot Project for Canned, Frozen, or Dried F&V

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle C, Sec. 4214

- Schools currently participating in the Fresh F&V Program (FFVP)
  will be selected to participate in a pilot project to evaluate
  the impacts of offering canned, frozen, or dried F&V on F&V
  consumption, school participation, among others
- USDA-Food and Nutrition Service
- Not less than 5 states
- Schools <u>not</u> in the pilot project must offer <u>fresh</u> F&V

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# 6. Food Insecurity Nutrition Incentive

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle C, Sec. 4208

- Cash incentives to SNAP eligible households for the purchase of fresh F&V at Farmers' Markets
- Mandatory funding (\$135 Million)
  - o \$35 Million for FY 2014 and 2015
  - o \$20 Million for FY 2016 and 2017
  - o \$25 Million for FY 2018
- \$5 Million authorized to be appropriated

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# 7. Valuation of Local or Regional Crops

Title V-Credit, Subtitle B, Sec. 5105

- Operating loans To facilitate lending to local and regional food producers, the Secretary will develop:
  - Ways to determine the value of crops used in locally or regionally produced agricultural food products (i.e. unit prices)
  - 2. Ways for producers to establish a **price history** for these crops



#### 8. Local Food Production and Program Evaluation

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10016

- The Secretary will conduct a study on locally or regionally produced ag. products
- 1. To collect data on:
- Production and marketing practices
- Direct and indirect costs for LFS of complying with federal regulations
- 2. To **facilitate** data sharing
- 3. To check
- Effectiveness of programs that support LFS
- Barriers to market access due to regulation
- 4. To evaluate the contribution of LFS to food security and food deserts

# 9. Reauthorization of the Organic Agriculture Research and Extension Initiative (OREI)

Title VII-Research, Extension, and Related Matters, Subtitle B, Sec. 7211

- Grants to support research and extension activities regarding organically grown and processed agricultural commodities
- Mandatory funding increased to \$20 M for each of FY 2014 through 2018
- USDA-National Institute of Food and Agriculture



#### 10. Organic Agriculture

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10004


- This bill expands the definition of "agricultural commodity" to include certified organics
- Mandates a technology upgrade for the database and technology systems of the National Organic Program
  - o Added funding of \$5 Million for FY 2014
- All certified organic producers, including those that also have conventional farming operations, may be exempted from commodity promotion orders on their organic production. Permission is established for an Organic Commodity Promotion Order



#### 10. Organic Agriculture

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10004

- Reauthorization of Organic Production and Market Data Initiatives (ODI)
  - o Multi-agency initiative (NASS, ERS, AMS)
  - o Mandatory funding remains at \$5 Million total
- Reauthorization of the National Organic Certification Cost-Share Program (NOCCSP)
  - o USDA-Agricultural Marketing Service
  - Mandatory funding increased to \$11.5 M for each of FY 2014 through 2018





# 11. Crop Insurance for Organic Crops

Title XI-Crop Insurance, Sec. 11023

- USDA's Risk Management Agency (RMA) is required to expand price elections for certified producers of organic crops insuring crops by 2015
- Efforts in developing and improving federal crop insurance for organic crops relevant to organic producers:
  - 1. Number and varieties of organic crops insured
  - 2. Progress of implementing price elections

## **Organic Foods Production Act of 1990**

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10005

• This bill grants specific powers to the Secretary to investigate products that are being fraudulently marketed as organic

#### 13. Tree Assistance Program (TAP)

Title I-Commodities, Subtitle E, Sec. 1501

- USDA-Farm Service Agency
- Provides qualifying orchardists and nursery tree growers with certain financial assistance to replant or re-habilitate crops after losses caused by natural disasters
- To cover losses starting in October 1, 2011

# **Assistance for Specialty Crops (TASC) Program**

Title III-Trade, Subtitle C, Sec. 3205

- Export assistance program that deals with sanitary and technical barriers to the export of U.S. specialty crops
- Market Development Programs by the USDA-Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS)
- Funding increased: \$9 Million for each of FY through 2018

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### 15. Reauthorization of the Market Access Program (MAP)

Title III-Trade, Subtitle B, Sec. 3102

- Designed to help U.S. agricultural trade associations, cooperatives, trade groups, and small businesses build export markets by providing technical assistance and sharing the costs of overseas marketing
- USDA-Foreign Agricultural Service (FAS)

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### 18. Purchase of Fresh Fruits and Vegetables



#### (F&V) For Distribution to Schools and Service Institutions

Title IV-Nutrition, Subtitle C, Sec. 4201

- The Secretary will continue to purchase F&V and other specialty crops for distribution to schools and service institutions
  - o \$200 Million each FY to purchase specialty crops
  - o Not less than \$50M for the purchase of *fresh* F&V



# 19. Locally or Regionally Produced



#### **Agricultural Food Products**

Title VI-Rural Development, Subtitle A, Sec. 6014

- Reauthorizes loan and loan guarantee authority for local and regional food enterprises through the Business and Industry Guaranteed Loans (B&I) program
- **USDA-Rural Development**
- Areas <50 Thousand people</li>

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# 20. Specialty Crop Committee

Title VII-Research, Extension, and Related Matters, Subtitle A, Sec. 7103

- 11 members
- Establishment of Citrus Disease Subcommittee
  - o Domestic producers from TX, FL, CA, and AZ

#### 21. Reauthorization of the



#### Specialty Crop Research Initiative (SCRI)

Title VII-Research, Extension, and Related Matters, Subtitle C, Sec. 7306

- Mandatory funding increased to \$80 Million for FY 2014 and thereafter
- Emergency Citrus Disease Research and Extension Grant Program, which will be funded from around 31% of the mandatory funds plus \$25 Million authorized
- New 100% matching funds requirement after October 1, 2014. Research agencies
  within the Dept. of Ag., and capacity infrastructure programs including land-grant
  universities exempt. Yearly waivers may be granted.

# **Specialty Crop Block Grants**

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10010

- Mandatory funding increased to \$72.5 Million for each of FY 2014 through 2017 and to \$85 Million for FY 2018 and thereafter
- Allowance of funding for multistate projects related to food safety, plant pests and disease, research, and commodityspecific projects
- Amount of grants to a State based on acreage of specialty crop production in addition to the average value of production
- 3. Limits on yearly administrative expenses

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# 24. Reauthorization of the Farmers' Market



# and Local Food Promotion Program (FMPP)

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10003

- Grants to help improve and expand domestic farmers' markets, roadside stands, CSAs, agri-tourism, and other D2C opportunities (Max. \$100K)
- USDA-Agricultural Marketing Service
- Mandatory funding introduced: \$30 Million for each of FY 2014 through 2018
- Funds not to be used in construction or infrastructure

#### 24. Reauthorization of the Farmers' Market



#### and Local Food Promotion Program (FMPP)

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10003

- Funds: 50% for projects that deal with domestic's farmers markets, roadside stands, CSA, agri-tourism, and other D2C opportunities, while 50% for local and regional food business enterprises (including those that are not D2C)
- New matching funds requirement in cash or in-kind contributions if the project deals with local and regional food business enterprises (25% of the total cost of the project)
- Limit of 4% on administrative expenses

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10006





#### 26. Clean Plant Network

Title X-Horticulture, Sec. 10007

- Consolidation of the National Clean Plant Network and the Pest and Disease Management and Disaster Prevention Program into a single program
- Increased funding for combined programs at \$62.5 Million for each of FY 2014 through 2017 and \$75 Million for FY 2018 and thereafter
